PASTOR'S PEN

In the course of a single day each of us are presented with countless questions. They can be as simple as the choice of beverage you want with your meal or as complex as trying to figure out a new remote control for the television. Some questions can leave you pondering, like when someone asks, "How has your life been different than what you imagined?" Other questions help to understand the person you have become by asking, "What is the most important lesson you have learned in life?"

Parents are constantly responding to questions from their children as they seek to grow in knowledge. Today Jesus asks his disciples two important questions. The first is a general kind of question, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" People have been talking about this Jesus person, the rumor mill was working very well and some of them speculated that he was one of the prophets that had returned. The second question Jesus asked is very personal, a question that can change your life. "Who do YOU say that I am?"

How you answer this question will determine, to a large part, how you live your life. Does it make any difference in your life that you are part of God's family? Does it make you more patient, less angry, more loving, less prideful, more moral, or more trustworthy? If you cannot answer yes, then it's time to do some soul searching regarding your answer to the question Jesus asked in today's gospel.

For some people Jesus is nothing more than a great teacher like the Buddha or a religious leader like Mohammed. For others he was a great humanitarian. "But you," Jesus asks, "who do YOU say that I am?" This question demands our attention because if we believe that Jesus is the Son of God then we must be willing to turn our will over to the care of God and see Him as our creator and redeemer. This means that we choose to give God authority over our lives and to follow His path as we journey through life.

In today's gospel we see that Jesus made the decision to pass the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven to Peter with the intention of building a community of the faithful. Jesus recognized the need for a shepherd, a keeper of the keys, which calls us into community and establishes a relationship of accountability. That is why it's not enough to have a private relationship with God. We need to be a part of a community of faith. The community of believers itself keeps us honest in our spiritual journey.

This is the story behind the story in our first reading. Shebna is rejected as the master of the palace, the keeper of the key to the House of David, because he did not trust in God. Rather than trusting God to protect him, Shebna removed stones from the houses of the people, taking down their homes so he could build a wall of defense for himself around the palace. So, God places Eliakim son of Hilkiah as the one in charge, the new keeper of the key because he is trustworthy. This is the image Jesus picks up on in our gospel as he names Peter as the keeper of the keys to the kingdom of heaven rather than entrusting them to the scribes or Pharisees.

If we say that we believe Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of the living God, then our lives must reflect this belief by becoming more and more like Jesus, trusting in the Will of the Father. This doesn't mean that we have to be perfect. Time and again, sacred scripture makes it clear that God works through those who are weak so there can be no question about the source of any success they may experience. All God asks is that we be faithful.

In a burst of praise St. Paul wrote, "Oh, the depth of the riches and wisdom and knowledge of God! For from him and through him and for him are all things." That was Paul's answer to the question Jesus asked. What is your answer to the question Jesus asks, "Who do YOU say that I am?"

Cathedral of St. Peter in Chains named a Minor Basilica. Holy Father, Pope Francis, has granted the title of Minor Basilica to St. Peter in Chains Cathedral in Cincinnati. The title is given to churches around the world in recognition of their historical or cultural importance, artistic beauty and significance in the life of the Church. The title denotes a closer relationship to the Pope. The title of Major Basilica is reserved to certain churches in Rome. Granted on June 29, the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, the Cathedral of St. Peter in Chains will now go by the name Cathedral Basilica of St. Peter in Chains and now becomes the 89th basilica in the United States. Built in 1845, the newly designated cathedral basilica will observe its 175th anniversary in November.


