DEACON RUSTY BALDWIN REFLECTION

A Warrior Spirit

Jeremiah was a mighty prophet of God, but he could hardly be called a popular one. Jeremiah called people to repentance, insisting that they turn away from their sins and back to the Lord their God. Israel, though, largely ignored Jeremiah, and when he could no longer be ignored, persecuted him for proclaiming such an objectionable message. You see, there were plenty of other so-called prophets who told the people what their itching ears wanted to hear, "All is well, God is pleased with us." But God was NOT pleased with them; they had abandoned observing the Sabbath, sacrificed their own children to false gods, and were blind to their own corruption and depravity. Nevertheless, Jeremiah preached the word of God his whole life, a man of grit and determination; he had a warrior's spirit. No matter what, he was going to complete his mission, whatever the cost; he would finish the task God had set before him.

And we're to have that same spirit because just as Jeremiah had a mission to be a witness to his nation, we too have the same mission to be a witness to our nation, to our community, to everyone we meet. And we too are at war – a spiritual war. A spiritual war that is raging all around us. And our mission in this war is to live out our faith in a culture that is hostile to Christ and becoming more so every day, one that is hostile to anyone who professes their faith openly. Our weapons? Prayer and a determination, like Jeremiah's, to be faithful no matter what, strengthened by the grace of the sacraments to live lives that honor the sacrifice Our Lord made out of love for us; a love so deep that he came down into the fray to fight side-by-side with us and for us.

But our two mortal enemies, Satan and the world, are crafty. And one of their most powerful weapons is deceit. They never tire of trying to lull us into thinking we are not at war at all. Everything is fine! No one sins anymore! Haven't you heard? God is love! Just go with the flow, God will understand! The power of Satan's lies is they contain some truth, just enough to trap us. God is indeed love, but that doesn't mean it's OK to sin, that doesn't mean it's OK to give up striving for holiness, that doesn't mean we don't have to be Christ to a fallen world. That God is love means that all the more we are to resist sin and resolve to be that beacon of hope and holiness to the world. Because he loves us, because we love Him! But that love must be willing to suffer for the beloved, to do anything for Our Lord...and such love is not based on warm, cozy, and superficial feelings. It is a decision to do what must be done whether it feels good not.

And lest we think that we are not called to suffer as disciples of Christ, Jesus himself rebukes St. Peter in the Gospel when he tried to turn Our Lord from the path of suffering. You see, Catholicism is not for the faint-hearted. It's not a feel-good Pollyanna religion. Our faith meets the world head on with stark realism. Our Lord assures us we will suffer as disciples. Not a popular message, but when we suffer in this life for the truth, for His sake, Our Lord also gives us the grace, strength, and even the inner joy to endure it. His Church and you and I as fellow believers are here to comfort, support, and help each other through the hard times and to rejoice together through the good times, and he uses the witness of our lives and yes, even our suffering for the sake of righteousness, to convince the world that there is something worth suffering for, that there is someone worth suffering for, and that someone loved them enough to suffer for them. Our faith, the faith handed on to us by those who have gone before us is worth suffering for.

Making Room for One Another - Over the last couple of weeks, we have seen an increase in attendance at our 10:30 Mass at Emmanuel. Welcome back! Respectful of the need for social distancing we are recommending that couples or single people use the side aisle pews for seating and families use the center pews as members of the same household can sit side-by-side. When sitting in the center section of pews, please move to the center of the pew so that we don't have open gaps in seating. Also, the first balcony is available for seating. For those who would like to avoid the crowds we suggest attending the 5:15 PM Mass which has plenty of seating available or the 6:00 PM Mass on Thursday's. For the distribution of Holy Communion, those seated in the side aisle pews are asked to follow the aisle to the back of church and process up the center aisle to receive Communion. This keeps traffic in the aisles flowing in the same direction. The Archbishop recently reaffirmed that the dispensation from Sunday Mass obligation remains in effect for the foreseeable future.

Miraculous Medal Novena with Adoration and Benediction...Join us on Tuesday evenings at 7:00pm for the Miraculous Medal Novena, with church doors opening at 6:30pm.
