PASTOR'S REFLECTION

Today's first reading from the Book of Job starts with the words, "Is not man's life on earth a drudgery?" It sounds like Job was having a bad day! Well, it was more than a bad day. If you remember, Job and his wife had 7 sons and 3 daughters. He owned a large estate which include over 7000 sheep, 3000 camels, 500 oxen and much more. Suddenly, his livestock is stolen, his children are swept away by a storm and he himself is stricken with a skin disease. For 36 long chapters Job tries to make sense out of his life, finally demanding an audience with God. Sometimes we feel a kinship to Job as we try to find meaning out of our suffering, illness or tragedies in life.

As part of his lament Job says, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; they come to an end without hope." This image reminded me of a poem by Benjamine Malachi Franklin entitled *The Weaver*.

My life is but a weaving between the Lord and me. I cannot choose the colors, God worketh steadily. Often time God worketh sorrow and I in foolish pride, Forget God sees the upper side and I the underside. Not till the loom is silent and the shuttle ceases to fly— God shall unroll the canvas and explain the reasons why. The dark threads are as needed in the weaver's skillful hands, As the threads of gold and silver in the pattern God has planned.

Our lives are much like a weaving which God carefully assembles, a weaving of experiences, family, friends and faith. Sometimes we may wonder like Job: "Why this?" or "Why that?" In our unending search to find out "why" we can easily lose focus, become consumed with self-pity and life becomes a drudgery full of misery, frustration and sleepless nights. In faith we are asked to keep our eyes on Jesus and the bigger picture of life that we share in Christ.

Like Job, like the people in Mark's Gospel who came to Jesus to be healed, we are aware of people whose days and nights have been filled with darkness and pain, worry and fear. All of us have been there at one time or another. Jesus is the one who can restore order to our lives returning life to the original blessing God intended for us at the creation of the world.

- Like Simon's mother-in-law, Jesus takes us by the hand and helps us up through family, friends and caring people so that we can experience once again the dignity of being a child of God.
- In restoring order, Jesus brings healing into our lives through a variety of ways, sometimes it's physical healing, sometimes its spiritual, emotional, psychological or relational healing.
- Then Jesus shows us by example the need to go to a quiet place and pray. This is a call to be in communion with God.

In many ways, the space for silence and prayer is missing from our day to day lives. Just as Jesus went off to a quiet place, we need to make room for silence. Some people find silence at the end of the day by sitting on the edge of their bed and naming one challenge and one blessing from the day. Others fast from the computer or TV for 30 minutes to sit in quiet prayer with the Lord. You can make room for silence by offering a prayer as we wait in line or simply spending five extra minutes in the bathroom if that is your only sanctuary. Just as Jesus needed to pray; we need to pray in silence.

Remember, often the quiet doesn't last long as we saw with Jesus and how the disciples hunted him down. "Everyone is looking for you" the disciples said. It may have been tempting to stay and build on this positive response, but Jesus knew that his mission was not about being successful. His message of salvation is for all people. So too in our lives, making time for quiet prayer is important because it gets us ready for whatever lies ahead, trusting in faith that God is with us. That quiet space helps us to look at life from the broader perspective and the larger weaving that God is creating.

In a moment of quiet, bring to God a need or a concern that you hold in your heart today. Hear Jesus say to you: "Do not let your hearts be troubled, have faith in my Father—have faith in me."
