REFLECTION

In his letter to the Ephesians, St. Paul reminds us that "we have been chosen by God before the world began." Stop and think about that message! Each one of us is uniquely called by God who created us in love, God who knows each of us by name. Like the prophet Amos, so often we can't imagine that God is calling ME. Amos said, "I'm not a prophet. I didn't come from a prophetic family line. I'm a shepherd and a dresser of sycamores. I'm just a common ordinary person."

Recall the context of today's first reading. Amos had been expelled from preaching in the sanctuary of Bethel by the high priest Amaziah who basically said, "take your worthless message somewhere else." But Amos stood his ground and said, "Hey, I'm not here to peddle my own message. The Lord told me, "Go, prophesy to the people of Israel." Amos had been summoned by God just like the disciples in today's gospel, to announce a message of conversion and hope.

But the call of God doesn't stop there. In baptism, we have been chosen and summoned by God to go and proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ. Not in the same way as Amos or the apostles, but in a manner worthy of the unique calling we have received.

Responding to this call is not easy. And so, Paul, who is writing this letter from prison, enthusiastically tells us that "no matter what challenge comes our way, we can remain faithful because God has "chosen us to be holy and blameless in his sight" and God has "blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavens." Do you really believe this?

We must believe this because "in Christ we have redemption by his blood, the forgiveness of our transgressions." What is redemption? The word redemption in Latin literally means "to buy back" "to be made free." Through the waters of Baptism, we are no longer slaves to sin. As St. Paul says in his letter to the Corinthians, "For you have been purchased at a price. Therefore, glorify God in your body." Jesus placed himself between life and death, offering his own blood so that the blood of others need not be shed. In this great act of love, Jesus rescued us, freeing us from the power of sin and death.

Unfortunately, we do not always accept the authority that has been given to us by Christ. We easily give in to the temptation of sin. We fall back into slavery and deny our identity as children of God. What is something that enslaves you today? What keeps you from reaching your full potential? Bring it to Jesus who is with us in our every struggle and allow him to be the source of your strength. We're here today not because we have it all together, but precisely because we recognize our need for a savior.

By acknowledging our sins, we are responding to the voice of Jesus summoning us to be released from our former way of life. Our call is to glorify God with our lives by working against evil-- getting rid of negativity, envy, hate, jealousy...anything that draws us back into slavery. We are to be people of integrity, living as God would have us live. This means we practice sincerity, honesty, fairness, and justice, always seeking to be true to what we believe.

Living this vision is possible because "God has given us every spiritual blessing in the heavens" we need to be faithful! To re-enforce this truth, Jesus gives himself to us in the Eucharist. Food from heaven to reassure us just how near God is to us. And if that isn't enough for us, Jesus gives us one another, his living body the Church to remind us, we never walk alone.

What keeps you from reaching your full potential?


