FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

Three people, a doctor, an engineer and a politician were arguing over whose contribution to humankind was greatest.

The doctor said, "the Lord created Eve from Adam; it was a surgical procedure in removing the rib from Adam, therefore we doctors were there from the beginning of creation!"

"No way," the engineer interrupted. "Go back a step: the Lord created the universe from chaos. That was the greatest engineering feat in history! MY profession was the one that was there at the beginning!"

"Fair enough," the politician piped in. "But who do you think created all that chaos in the first place?" (As told by David Pleacher)

In our first reading today, we heard about the creation of the world and God's original dream for humanity. God saw that it was not good for the man to be alone and so He worked to create a partner suitable for him. The birds and the animals were given to him so that he would not be alone and yet there was still restlessness in the man's heart. Then God fashioned a woman from the same substance as the man and Adam cries out, *"This one at last is bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh!"*

In today's gospel Jesus takes the Pharisees back to the original dream that God intended for marriage, to the time before sin entered the world. He does this because in the time of Jesus divorce was quite common. In that time women were basically seen as property. In some cases, a man's wife could be gotten rid of because she did something to displease her husband, something as simple as burning a meal or not cleaning his clothes properly. There was no equality in marriage. Moses permitted a certificate of divorce as a safeguard to the woman because without it she could simply be abandoned by her spouse, unable to marry another man. Jesus wanted the Pharisees to know that Moses did not go far enough. People are not things to be used and then disposed of at will, but a gift of God's creative love.

This is symbolically shown as Eve is created out of the rib of Adam. Scripture scholars tell us that the word for rib in Hebrew is "Tsela." This word can be translated as rib bone or a rib like the side of a boat. When God takes the "Tsela" from the man to make woman we can think of God taking Adam's side and creating woman, in a sense dividing Adam into two human beings. Reflecting on this image we can say that Adam and Eve were not simply two beings but two halves of the one whole which establishes the equality of man and woman, both created in God's image and likeness. They were not created as competitive beings, but two beings that complete each other as one.

This is why marriage has been called the "school of love," where husband and wife learn to cherish and make sacrifices for each other and, by accepting children lovingly from God; parents are able to experience the fullness of joy and God's creative love. The total, one -flesh union of husband and wife is to be fruitful, never self-enclosed; it is to be open to the other and open to the gift of the children.

This is why the church holds marriage in such high esteem. As a sacrament marriage tells us something about God. The deep, intimate love and trust that a husband and wife share in a sacramental marriage is a glimpse to us of the kind of love that God has for each of us. As a sacrament, the love of husband and wife is to be a "real and visible sign of the love of Christ for the Church." (Eph. 5:32) In order for the Church to be healthy it is important that the family, the domestic Church be healthy.

In the beautiful story of creation, we see that each of us is created in love and our need for one another is stitched into the very fiber of our being. Whether we are married, single, vowed religious or ordained we are intimately connected to one another. May the Lord grant us the grace to see his love revealed in our lives, and the grace to respond by respecting and protecting human life in all its stages.
